Important Announcements

Students in provisional status will not be registered until they have successfully completed the English and Math requirements. Also, students in provisional status are only eligible to be in one pathway at a time.

Emphasis is on criminal justice systems, criminology, juvenile justice, criminal and constitutional law, investigative principles, ethics, and community relations. Additional study may include issues and concepts of government, counseling, communications, computers, and technology.

Employment opportunities exist in a variety of local, state, and federal law enforcement, corrections, and security fields. Examples include police officer, deputy sheriff, county detention officer, state trooper, intensive probation/parole surveillance officer, correctional officer, and loss prevention specialist. SPCC offers the following Degrees, Diplomas, and Certificates in Criminal Justice Technology:

Career and College Promise (CCP) Reminders



CFNC Application: The new college application is now available. All CCP students should select Career & College Promise as their entrance status. Once selected, the CTP and CTE pathways will be listed. It is important that students select the correct pathway of interest. In addition, it is now more important than ever, that we make sure students are eligible. Frequent communication will be required!

Transcripts: Students can send their transcripts to SPCC by selecting “Send Transcript” through CFNC at www.cfnc.org.

Scores: Your assigned Enrollment Recruiter will request copies of qualifying test scores directly from the high school guidance counselor and confirm eligibility to participate.

How to Get Started: Page 24 of our CCP Program Guide is now updated to reflect the changes to the application process for CCP students. Please have your students follow these instructions.

Forms: Please make sure you are using the updated forms for Eligibility and Registration, Withdrawals, and FERPA. All outdated forms that are submitted will be returned for correction. Again, students will be registered primarily through SPCC visits at the local high school.

Summer 2018: One More Opportunity for Free College Tuition!!!

Summer 2018 will begin on May 29. All CCP eligible students and graduating seniors are encouraged to continue taking free college classes over the summer. This is a great option for students who are looking to cut the cost of their college education by earning transfer credits or career related skills. SPCC general education courses are accepted at all state-supported colleges and universities as well as a host of private schools. Please remind your seniors to send their official college transcripts to schools they plan to attend in the fall. This enables the gaining institution to evaluate and apply credits to their future college program. Promote summer registration to students with the potential to succeed and encourage graduates to enroll at SPCC in the fall.

Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) Pathway

The Career and College Promise (CCP) ADN Pathway is designed for high school juniors and seniors who wish to begin their educational studies toward the Associate in Nursing degree and a Baccalaureate degree in Nursing. No student is guaranteed admission into the program of his or her choice due to the competitive nature of nursing program admission.

Associate in Fine Arts in Visual Arts Pathway

Coming 2018 Fall!

The CCP College Transfer Pathway Leading to the Associate in Fine Arts in Visual Arts is designed for high school juniors and seniors who wish to begin study toward the Associate in Fine Arts in Visual Arts and a baccalaureate degree in Fine Arts-Visual Arts.

Pathway Changes: A student may change his or her program of study with approval of the high school principal or his/her designee and the college's chief academic officer or chief student development administrator. The college's chief academic officer or chief student development administrator shall approve a change in pathway based on verification provided by the student that the program change allows the student to meet their newly chosen career path. Verification could include (but is not limited to) a bachelor degree plan published by the university, a career pathway plan, career information published in the Occupational Outlook Handbook and/or information published in the North Carolina Career Cluster Guide, etc.

More Important News

Graduating Class of 2018



If a student is graduating in June and would like to take advantage of free tuition during the summer semester, it's possible through the Career and College Promise (CC) program!

If a student is eligible for CCP enrollment on the first day of the summer semester (Tuesday, May 29) the eligible student can take summer classes through the CCP program. Students who have never participate in the CCP program will need to complete the CCP program application process and receive permission from their high school guidance counselor.

June graduates who want to register for fall semester classes, will need to complete a new application to SPCC. As a regular curriculum student (freshman/transfer), they will also need to complete the North Carolina Residency Determination Service application to obtain a Residency Certification Number (RCN). This process can be completed independently or through a link that is provided within the college application process.

All high school graduates are required to show college readiness through one of the Multiple Measures eligibility options shown on the next page. Students who submit an unofficial transcript (prior to their actual graduation date) and meet Multiple Measures eligibility are able to register at our campus Advising Centers for the fall semester beginning on Monday, March 26.

Multiple Measures

Option 1 – Multiple Measures Waiver for North Carolina High School Graduates:

Student's official transcript must show:

1. Graduated within 5 years of starting classes at SPCC
2. Achieved an un-weighted GPA of 2.6 or higher
3. Completed a fourth level math course as listed below:

Option 2 – Standardized Test Scores

Evidenced by official SAT or ACT test scores taken within 5 years of starting classes at SPCC.

Option 3 - College-Level Credit

The completion of college-level English and or math from a regionally accredited institution with a grade of "C" or higher. **This may be the case for a CCP student who has completed college-level English and/or math with a grade of "C" or higher.**

Option 4 - Advanced Placement (AP) and College Level Exam Program (CLEP) Waivers

As evidenced by official score reports sent to SPCC directly from Advanced Placement (AP) or College Level Exam Program (CLEP) agencies for required English and or math. Scores vary by test and subject area. Visit AP or CLEP websites for full details.

Students must present all appropriate documentation when requesting a waiver. Students who qualify for a waiver in either English or math but not both will need to complete the CPT section not exempted.
