Writing as Inquiry

- Writing should be a process of discovery.
- Begin with questions:
 - How can my topic be defined?
 - Described?
 - Explained?
 - Analyzed?
 - What are the different viewpoints?
 - What are my feelings?
 - WHO? WHAT? WHEN? WHERE? WHY? HOW?



Writing POWER

- **P**lan and **P**rewrite (and **P**reliminary Research)
- **O**rganize
- **W**rite
- **E**dit **R**evise

- All good writing revolves around ideas.
- Many writers need to write out their ideas and play with them.

Freewriting

- Write quickly without stopping
 - 5-10 minutes
- Write subject at top of paper
 - No Subject
 - Just Start Writing
- Read
- Write



Organizing

- Outline
- “Hourglass”
 - The hourglass lays out the organizational Pattern for you.
- Thesis Statement
 - If you have a workable, three-pronged THESIS – then you have the order already set.



Writing

- Write your draft quickly
- Write your draft in one sitting
- Write to discover what you want to say
- Don't worry about grammatical or factual correctness just write.



Writing

- Establish personal deadlines
 - Start early
 - Break assignment up into smaller assignments
 - Stick to self-determined deadlines

Writing (Continued)

- Be Flexible
 - Writing is part of a process of discovery.
 - Expect the words to take you in a different direction.
 - Follow a new path if it takes you where you want to go.



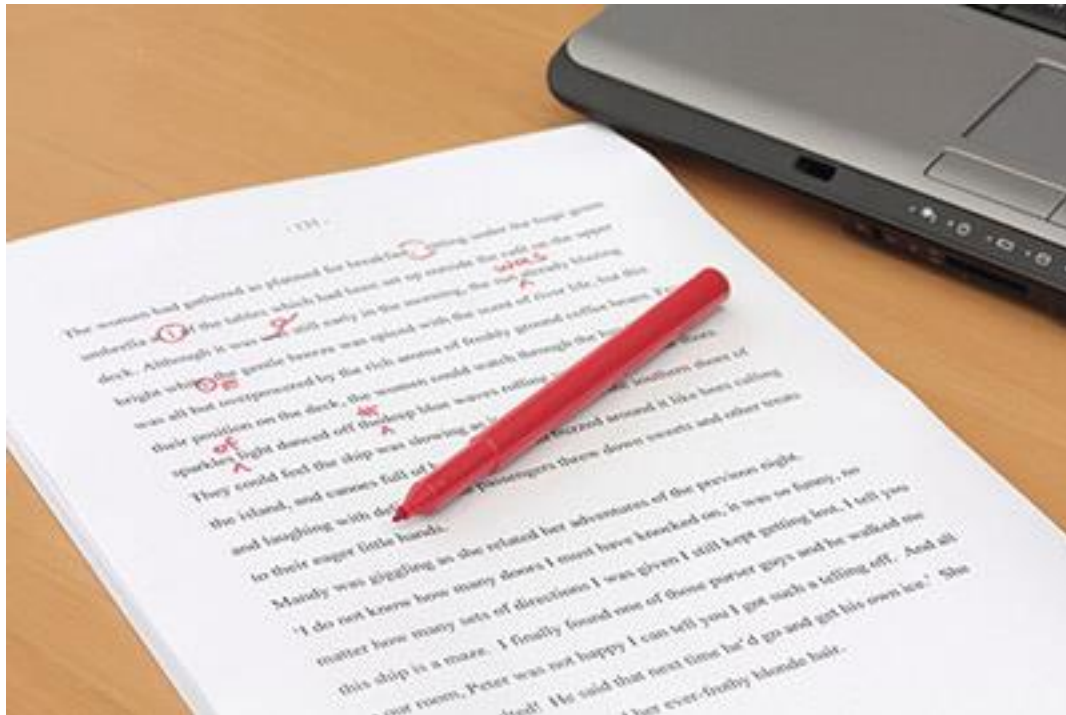
Writer's Block!

- Missing words and phrases?

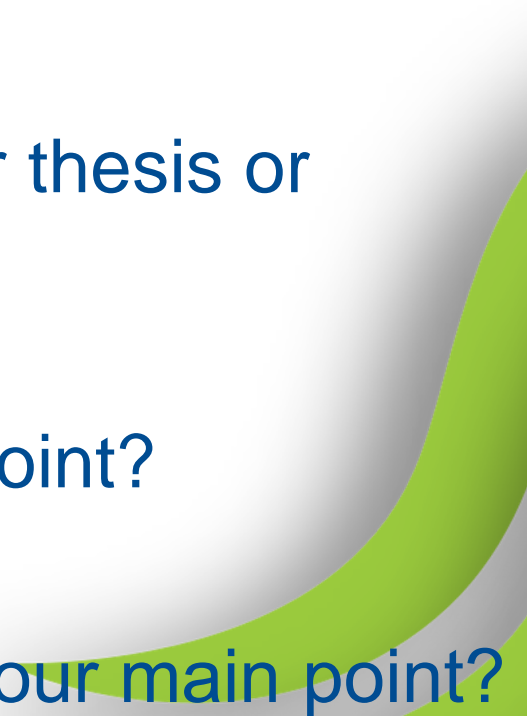


Revising: Examining the Text



- Assess with critical eye
- Does it meet the rhetorical situation?
 - Purpose
 - Audience
 - Stance
- Review global issues:
 - Focus/thesis
 - Organization
 - Reasons and support
 - Clarity

Revising: Focus/Thesis

- What is your THESIS? Is it narrow or broad enough for your audience?
 - How does the beginning focus attention on your thesis or main point?
 - Does each paragraph support or develop that point?
 - Does the ending leave readers thinking about your main point?
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Revising: Organization and Guiding the Reader

- Do I have a clear hook and background and thesis in the INTRO?
- Do I have multiple paragraphs in the BODY?
- Do I have a CONCLUSION that restates the thesis, summarizes, etc?
- Is your text complete? Does your genre require a References or Works Cited page?
- What TRANSITIONS help readers move from idea to idea?
- Is each paragraph related with topic sentences that GUIDE my reader?

Revising: Reasons and Support

- What REASONS and EVIDENCE do you give to support your thesis?
- What key terms and concepts do you DEFINE?
- Is there LOGOS—logical explanations and quotes and information that support my thesis?
- Is my information credible and documented?



Revising: Clarity

- Does your title announce the subject and create interest?
- Do you state your THESIS directly?
- Does your beginning tell readers what they need to understand about your text?
- Does your ending help make sense of your intentions?
- Do you provide appropriate background information?
- Do you use TRANSITIONS and vary your sentences?

Revising: Getting Response

- The most helpful eyes belong to others.
- Easy for others to see mistakes
 - Peers
 - Tutors
 - Instructor
- Take advantage of the Academic Support Center!



Revising: Getting Response

- Give yourself time to revise
 - Set deadlines
 - Practice savage editing
 - Nothing is sacred
 - Cut out what does not work
- Revise to sharpen your focus
 - Examine your THESIS
 - Does it match your PURPOSE?
 - Ensure paragraphs contribute to your main point.
 - Read your beginning and ending
 - Do the first paragraph introduce topic?
 - Do the final paragraph bring closure?

Revising: Based on Response

- Revise to strengthen the argument
 - Define terms
 - Add examples
 - Provide detail
 - Add additional research
- Revise to improve organization
 - Paragraphs follow the previous appropriately
 - Use transitions to connect paragraphs
 - Delete what does not work
